At Key Stage 4, students study core curriculum GCSEs: English Language, English Literature, Maths and Science. Students then select subjects and qualifications which enable them to succeed: these subjects may be EBACC GCSE subjects or a more vocational suite of qualifications.

There is a wide range of support for our students. Our Curriculum Hub provides interventions for students with specific learning needs — such as literacy and numeracy support — but also runs extra-curricular sessions for students to develop social skills and raise self-esteem. Students who arrive from other countries receive highly targeted support, in lessons but also in small group sessions, led by specialist staff.

There is also multi-layered support for students with Mental Health needs, from bespoke, individual counselling to raising awareness across whole year groups about Mental Health in Session 0 – our daily PSHE lessons. As a school, we pride ourselves on offering support to all of our students, whilst developing personalised approaches for individuals in need of more specialised help.



Personal Development











Across every aspect of school life, we encourage our students to become the young people they want to be: our school values constantly promote the ways they can grow as a person and take their place in the world. Central to this are assemblies and Session 0, which take place at the start of every day and which always include students' wellbeing: these parts of the school day seek to prepare students for the world we live in and to empower them for their next stage in life.

During Session Zero in particular, students consider topics such as their current and future roles in society and how they can be best prepared for this with practical topics such as how to write a cv and apply for a job, how to prepare for exams and money management. We also have a wide range of opportunities for our students to take on leadership roles, from Form Representatives to whole school roles.

In assemblies, we learn about the school's values and how these will help us even after we leave Smithills School and we will always need them. Session 0 is our form time and we learn about many different things: we do many activities and it is a time where we explore our creativity. During form, we are taught how to apply for college and how to apply for a job which has been really helpful showing me what I can do when I leave school.


Ton

We offer an enriched curriculum to all our students. This curriculum includes: a fabulous production, which is open to all year groups and to students of all Performing Arts abilities; the Duke of Edinburgh award, which is open to students in year 9 and upwards; and each year, Year 10 have a designated work experience week where they are encouraged to find a work placement in a local workplace.

During my Bronze Duke of Edinburgh I have developed a lot of different skills. I think it has really helped with my independence, teamwork and also has improved my physical and volunteering work. I had to work in a team so we could navigate our routes, using maps and compasses to guide our way through a 16km walk.
